PIDA is intended to deal with serious matters in the public interest. The legal threshold in PIDA for proving wrongdoing is stringent, and there are instances where accusations or supporting evidence are not sufficient to support an investigation under the Act. For example, not all mismanagement is considered wrongdoing; only “gross or systemic” mismanagement is.
